

The recent Community Health Needs Assessment, Franklin County HealthMap 2019: Navigating Our Way to a Healthier Community Together identified mental health and addiction, poverty/income and maternal and infant health as the priority health needs facing Franklin County residents. Mount Carmel Health System continues to provide hope and healing to the most vulnerable in our communities by being a compassionate and transforming healing presence.



MENTAL HEALTH & ADDICTION



850 Naloxone kits were distributed at 35 Mount Carmel Project DAWN (death avoided with naloxone) events. Community members were taught to recognize opiate overdoses and which lifesaving steps to, including administering Naloxone.

The Street Medicine Program provided medical, spiritual and behavioral health services to 18,861 individuals who were new to America, homeless, uninsured or underinsured with barriers to obtaining healthcare services in central Ohio.



The Crime and Trauma Assistance Program provided education, training, therapeutic advocacy, outreach and therapeutic intervention at no cost to 30,989 individuals who were victims, survivors and co-survivors of crime or trauma.



POVERTY/INCOME



Mount Carmel Health System has invested in our most important resources—our colleagues—by increasing the minimum wage of the organization to **\$15 per hour.**

Under construction



A new project to positively impact patient housing stability is underway. With assistance from community partners, Mount Carmel identified marginally housed individuals those who are at risk of homelessness or are homeless—and connected them with affordable and quality housing or helped with eviction avoidance.

13,566 Assisted individuals



The Low Income Pharmacy at Mount Carmel assisted 13,566 qualified individuals in obtaining medications at little or no cost through various medication assistance programs.



MATERNAL & INFANT HEALTH



Mount Carmel's Welcome Home Program provided 10,776 support calls and in-home visits from a registered nurse that are aimed to ease the transition from the hospital to home and reduce infant mortality.

Healthy Start served 5,247



Healthy Start – My Baby and Me served 5,247 individuals by providing assistance for at-risk, pregnant Franklin County residents willing to receive ongoing, intermittent home visits before and after delivery by a registered nurse. The evidencebased maternal child health and public health curriculum included well woman care, breastfeeding, infant safe sleep and family/reproductive life planning.
